# Standard Operating Procedures for the Protection of Victims and Potential Victims of Trafficking<sup>1</sup>

#### GENERAL PRINCIPLES

The Standard Operating Procedures for the Protection of Victims and Potential Victims of Trafficking are built on the following guiding principles, which constitute the conceptual framework for the protection of victims and potential victims of trafficking.

- 1. The Standard Operating Procedures approach is based on human rights and is a sensitive approach to protecting the victim and potential victim of trafficking, aiming at their best interest.
- 2. Protecting the rights of trafficked persons will be the center of all efforts to prevent, protect and reintegrate them, regardless of the victim's willingness or ability to testify in court. Providing the opportunity for rehabilitation, giving them the opportunity to resume a normal life, is not simply a human obligation of the state, but also a preventive measure against retrafficking.
- 3. Any person identified as a victim or potential victim of trafficking shall be offered free assistance and protection and shall be guaranteed timely assistance and protection of his/her choice. All procedures relating to victims of trafficking or potential victims of trafficking shall be always carried out with serious security measures in place.
- 4. Although it is the fruit of the coordinated efforts of the government, organizations providing services to victims/potential victims of trafficking, civil society and international partners, the responsibility for implementing the Standard Operating Procedures falls on state institutions. Consequently, state institutions are committed to mobilizing the necessary human and financial resources for implementation, mainly from their own resources.
- 5. No measure against trafficking in persons shall violate human rights and dignity, in particular the rights of trafficked persons, migrants, displaced persons, stateless persons, refugees, asylum seekers and other persons in need.
- 6. The Standard Operating Procedures specifically consider the special obligation that the state has in relation to children, more specifically the protection of children's rights, in accordance

- with the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (1989), and Law No. 18/2017 "On the Rights and Protection of the Child" based on their best interests.
- 7. The identification and referral for assistance of trafficked persons shall be carried out in full coordination and cooperation of all state or non-state authorities and structures. The identification of victims/potential victims of trafficking shall be carried out not as an end, but to assist and protect them.
- The implementation of procedures for the identification, referral, and assistance of victims or potential victims of trafficking shall be carried out equally and without any form of discrimination, on the grounds of gender, race, color, language, religion, political or other beliefs. social or national origin, property, birth. any other All actions shall be undertaken in accordance with the specific needs of individuals, taking into consideration cases such as pregnant women, health conditions, disabilities, mental or psychological disorders, as well as situations in which individuals have suffered severe forms of psychological, physical, or sexual violence.
- 9. Assisted voluntary return for victims/potential victims of trafficking will be enabled and guaranteed by the country of origin and destination, by assessing the situation of the persons in the country of origin and the family before returning and making the decision to return in their best interest.
- 10. The government exercises appropriate authority in identifying, preventing the involvement of public officials implicated in trafficking and takes measures to punish them according to the legislation in force.
- 11. Whenever necessary and possible, victims of trafficking will be offered inclusion in the witness protection program.
- 12. The participation of organizations providing services to victims/potential victims of trafficking and civil society is essential to achieving the objectives of the Standard Operating Procedures, namely, protection, prevention and assistance to victims of this crime. All state and non-state actors, including civil society, participate in the design and implementation of the activity. of the fight against trafficking in persons, in monitoring its implementation and in regularly reviewing the implementation of procedures.
- 13. Civil society organizations, and in particular NGOs, play a key role in the fight against human trafficking, and as such, their opinions and views are well reflected in the drafting and implementation of these Standard Operating Procedures.

#### DEFINITIONS

"Victim of trafficking" (VT) has the same meaning according to letter "e" of article 4, of law no. 9642 dated 20.11.2006 "On the ratification of the Council of Europe Convention "On measures against trafficking in human beings".

"Potential victim of trafficking" (VMT) is a person for whom the agencies/institutions responsible for initial identification, based on indicators/indicators/in the light of the specific circumstances of the case, in which at least three or more elements constitute a reasonable suspicion that the person may have been trafficked.

"Child" is any person under the age of 18.

"Child in need of protection" is a person under the age of 18, regardless of the acquisition of the capacity to act, according to the legislation in force, who may be a victim of abuse, neglect, exploitation, discrimination, violence or any other criminal activity, as well as an individual under the age of criminal responsibility who is suspected of having committed or is accused of having committed a criminal offense, as well as children in conflict with the law. Where the age of a person subject to trafficking is uncertain and there are reasons to believe that the person is a child, that person is presumed to be a child in order to receive immediate access to assistance, support and protection.

"The best interests of the child" is a three-fold concept, a fundamental right, a fundamental principle of legal interpretation, and a procedural rule. The best interest of the child is the fundamental right of the child, that whenever a decision must be made concerning a child, an identified or unidentified group of children, or children in general, the best interests of the child should be assessed and that these interests should prevail over the interests of other parties. As a fundamental principle of legal interpretation, it means that, if a legal provision is open to more than one interpretation, the interpretation that best serves the interests of the child should be chosen. As a procedural rule, it means that whenever there is to be a decision affecting a child, or a group of children, the decision-making process should include an assessment of all the effects (positive and negative) of the decision on the child and/or group of children.

"Protection of trafficked persons" includes all actions carried out by employees of central and local state institutions, as well as non-state institutions - members or not of the National Referral Mechanism - for the reception, identification, immediate assistance and assistance for the rehabilitation and safe reintegration of trafficked persons in accordance with these procedures.

**The Responsible Authority (RA)** is a structure established by Joint Instruction No. 132, dated 08.09.2023 "On the Establishment of the Responsible Authority for the Identification, Referral, Protection and Reintegration of Victims/Potential Victims of Trafficking". The Responsible

Authority consists of representatives of the ministries signing the instruction for its establishment, as well as a representative of the National Coalition of Anti-Trafficking Shelters.

"Corresponding Member of the Responsible Authority (APAP)", is the member of the Responsible Authority to whom any professional or staff of the institution and the structures subordinate to the institution that he/she represents addresses in relation to victims/potential victims of trafficking. The APAP makes his/her position known to the basic structures of the institution that he/she represents, serves as a receiver and transmitter of information from the institution and structures subordinate to the Responsible Authority, communicates with the Head/Chair of the AP, the Technical Secretariat of the AP and other members regarding the needs of the cases, guides and monitors the actions of the structures for the protection of victims/potential victims of trafficking.

"Director/Head of the Responsible Authority (D/KAP)", is the Director of the Directorate responsible for Anti-Trafficking in the Ministry of Internal Affairs.

"Trafficking indicators" are descriptive elements of the trafficking process that reflect the appearance of the effects/consequences of trafficking in persons with Albanian or foreign citizenship up to the drafting of this document.

"Basic needs/rights during identification and initial response and their fulfillment", include at a minimum the basic needs/rights for food, sleep, shelter, medical, psychosocial assistance, communication in an understandable language, contact with family, etc.

"Basic protection needs/rights of trafficked persons" include, at a minimum, the free provision of a package of services, such as: adequate and safe housing, psychological and material assistance, immediate medical treatment and ongoing health care, translation when necessary, counseling and information, especially on legal rights, assistance in presenting and being considered during the proceedings of traffickers, access to education, vocational training and employment. The information provided to victims of trafficking shall cover, where relevant, information on a reflection and recovery period.

"Emergency protection measure" is a temporary protection measure taken by the director of the structure responsible for social services, for the removal of the child and placement in alternative care when it is assessed to be in a situation of high and immediate risk due to abuse, exploitation, neglect or any form of violence and for which the child protection worker and the state police or prosecutor's office structures have suspicions or facts that the family or environment where the minor is staying is not safe for the child.

"Case Manager" refers to the child protection worker who, from the moment of identification or referral, is responsible for the development and implementation of the protection measure and the Individual Protection Plan until their completion.

"Case worker", according to this document, is a social worker, psychologist or trained staff assigned to provide assistance and mediation for trafficked persons. The case worker acts within an advisory group with other professionals, when decisions need to be made on the care plan for each person. The case worker, in the case of a child suspected of being trafficked or identified as being trafficked by the G/SPIF, is the child protection worker in the local unit where the case is assisted, or the social worker of the reception or rehabilitation center for victims of trafficking, in adulthood.

The "Group/Structure Responsible for Formal Identification (G/SPIF)", according to this document, is the structure responsible for formal identification, established (ad hoc), which conducts the formal interview of persons identified as potential victims of trafficking, composed of a state police officer from the section for the fight against illegal trafficking (SLKTP) and the child protection officer/PMU in the municipality/administrative unit for each case of minors and a state social worker from the regional office of the state social service (ZRSHSS) for adults.

"Re/integration of trafficked persons" is the process of recovery and social and economic inclusion following an experience of trafficking. It includes placement in a safe and stable environment, access to a reasonable standard of living, physical and mental well-being and opportunities for personal, social, economic development and access to social and emotional support. A central aspect of successful re/integration is that of empowerment, supporting victims to develop skills towards independence and self-sufficiency and to be actively involved in their recovery and re/integration.

"Safe, ethical communication with trafficked persons" refers to communications in safe environments that maintain the principles of: non-harm, physical security, confidentiality, non-discrimination, clear and understandable communication, tolerance, etc.

"Information to support the investigation" is the information provided by the victim/potential victim of trafficking during the interview by the G/SPIF or during the reintegration process, which is forwarded to the Responsible Authority for further follow-up by the structure responsible for the investigation.

"Trafficking in adult persons" has the same meaning according to Article 110/a of the Criminal Code of the Republic of Albania.

"Trafficking in minors" has the same meaning according to Article 128/b of the Criminal Code of the Republic of Albania.

"Minor" is a person under the age of 18, in accordance with applicable criminal and civil legislation.

- "Witness to justice" is a person who, in the capacity of a witness or injured person, makes statements or testifies about facts and circumstances that constitute the object of evidence in a criminal proceeding and who, due to these statements and testimonies, is in a state of danger.
- "Human Trafficker" is any person convicted by a final court decision for the criminal offense of human trafficking.
- "Parent" is the person who gave birth to or adopted the child, whether as a couple or alone, married or not, or who has recognized the motherhood or paternity of the child born out of wedlock.
- "Procedural representative" is the person appointed by the proceeding authority from the list sent by the child protection unit, who will carry out the procedural representation of the child in the absence of his/her legal representative or, in the event of a conflict of interest between him/her and the child and has representation rights on behalf of the child in conflict with the law, or the child witness/victim of trafficking or potential victim of trafficking, in order to protect the best interest of the child.
- "Trusted Person" refers to an adult requested by the minor and accepted by the competent authority, who accompanies the minor during the stages of the criminal proceedings.
- "Unaccompanied foreign minor" is a foreign minor who enters the territory of the Republic of Albania, unaccompanied by a responsible adult, according to the law and as long as he is not effectively taken into care by him, or a minor who is left unaccompanied after entering the territory of the Republic of Albania.
- "Unaccompanied child" is a minor who has been separated from both parents or other family relatives and who is not cared for by an adult, according to Law No. 18/2017 "On the Rights and Protection of the Child".
- "Asylum seeker" is any foreign citizen or stateless person who has applied for international protection, for which a final and conclusive decision has not yet been taken.
- "Residence permit" is the document issued by the competent authorities, which authorizes and allows the foreigner to stay in the Republic of Albania for more than 90 days within 180 days.
- "Social care services" is an integrated and organized system of benefits and facilities, which are provided by professionals in the relevant fields of public or non-public entities, with the aim of ensuring the well-being, independence and social inclusion of individuals and families in need of social care.

The "State Social Service (SSS)" is an institution under the ministry responsible for social affairs. It monitors the implementation of social services legislation throughout the country, through the structures of the central unit and regional directorates.

"Economic assistance" is the financial support provided to families and individuals in need, according to the provisions of Law No. 9355, dated 10.03.2005 "On social assistance and services", as amended. Victims of trafficking are included in the beneficiaries of economic assistance, after leaving social care institutions, until the moment of their employment.

"Shelters/centers for victims of trafficking" have the same meaning according to Law No. 121/2016 "On social care services in the Republic of Albania".

"Report" is the reference to the facts related to the criminal offense. The reporting of the victims of trafficking, whether minor or adult, as persons harmed by the criminal offense is voluntary, and is done according to the specific provisions of the Code of Criminal Procedure.

"Refugee" is an alien or stateless person who, owing to a well-founded fear of being persecuted for reasons of race, religion, nationality, membership of a particular social group or political opinion, is outside the country of his nationality or habitual residence and is unable or unwilling to avail himself of the protection of that country or to return to it, as a result of these circumstances, in accordance with the criteria of Article 1(A) of the Geneva Convention.

"Agencies/Institutions Responsible for Protection (A/IPM)", are all institutions mentioned in this document as primarily responsible for actions to protect trafficked persons.

The National Referral Mechanism refers to the process of identifying and referring victims/potential victims of trafficking for assistance, while ensuring the protection of their rights. The NRM ensures that the protection of the rights of victims of trafficking is guaranteed by an effective protection system and at the same time ensures the prosecution of traffickers. The rights of victims of trafficking protected by the NRM include, among others, safe identification and referral, protection from discrimination, free legal aid, protection of personal data and privacy, provision of assistance and support on a consensual and informed basis, provision of housing, health and social care, recovery and reflection period, temporary or permanent residence permit, compensation, the right to asylum or protection from unsafe return to the country of origin.

#### PURPOSE

The Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) for the protection of victims of trafficking aim to provide a clear, harmonized and functional framework for all state and non-state institutional links involved in addressing this complex and sensitive phenomenon.

They define the steps to be followed and the clear division of responsibilities between the actors involved in all stages of the process – from the initial identification of a potential case to the long-term support and reintegration of the victim into society.

These procedures are built on the principle of respect for human rights and place the victim at the center of action, ensuring a comprehensive, gender, disability and age-sensitive approach, as well as adapted to the individual needs of each case. They aim not only to prevent trafficking, but also to provide an effective and coordinated response for the identification, protection, assistance, assisted voluntary return and reintegration of victims of trafficking and potential victims, regardless of whether they are Albanian or foreign citizens, and regardless of whether they are identified inside or outside the territory of the Republic of Albania.

The procedures respond to the need for a sustainable institutional system, which guarantees that no victim or potential victim of trafficking is left unattended, and that each institution acts in a coordinated and standardized manner, without overlaps or gaps in responsibilities.

At the same time, the SOPs represent an important step in the alignment of the Albanian regulatory framework and practice with European Union standards, as well as with the ongoing recommendations of national and international reports that have assessed the institutional response to trafficking in human beings in Albania. In their content and structure, the procedures consider the need for continuous improvement of existing mechanisms, especially in terms of capacities for formal identification, investigation, psychosocial assistance, prosecution of perpetrators and support for victims on the path to a new and safe life.

In this context, the SOPs are conceived as a practical working tool, legal reference and operational guide for all institutions that are part of the national mechanism for the fight against trafficking in human beings, including the State Police, regional and local social services, employment and vocational training services, local authorities, educational and health institutions, as well as non-governmental organizations and international partners.

The effective implementation of these procedures is an essential condition for ensuring full and sustainable protection of victims of trafficking, for increasing institutional efficiency and for strengthening victims' trust in Albanian institutions.

# IDENTIFICATION AND REACTION INITIAL

**Identification and Initial Response** refers to the set of actions undertaken by employees of state and non-state institutions, at both local and central levels, responsible for the protection of trafficked persons at the borders, within, and outside the territory of the Republic of Albania,

which determine whether a person, child or adult, is a victim or a potential victim of trafficking in persons.

# The state and non-state agencies/institutions responsible for initial identification are:

- State police structures,
- o NCSAT,
- social care centers for people in need,
- o organizations with assistance programs for people in need,
- o regional offices of the state social service in the counties,
- Central Labor Inspectorate,
- Trade unions.
- schools and educational institutions,
- o health care institutions, including structures that provide psychosocial services
- o social service structures in the municipality,
- Child protection units/workers
- Outside the territory of the Republic of Albania, the agencies/institutions responsible for identifying potential victims of trafficking with Albanian citizenship are employees of the diplomatic missions of the Republic of Albania,
- o other state and non-state agencies with activities in the field of protection of victims of trafficking.

#### Indicators of human trafficking

#### Persons who have been trafficked may:

- o They believe they must work against their will.
- o They were threatened to work against their will.
- Not being able to leave the work environment.
- They show signs that their movements are controlled by someone else.
- o They feel unable to leave.
- They show fear or anxiety.
- Are subject to violence or threats of violence against themselves or their family and loved ones.
- They have injuries that appear to be the result of an attack.

- Have injuries or damage typical of certain types of work or control measures.
- They are distrustful of authorities.
- They were threatened with being handed over to the authorities.
- o They are afraid to reveal their migration status.
- Not be in possession of passports or identity documents, as these are held by someone else.
- o They have false identity or travel documents.
- Are located in or related to places used for the exploitation of people.
- o They don't know the local language.
- Don't know their home or work address.
- o They allow others to talk about them when addressed directly.
- o They act as if they were instructed by someone else.
- o They are forced to work in conditions that are contrary to labor legislation standards.
- They are disciplined through punishments.
- Not being able to negotiate working conditions.
- o They signed a contract in a language they don't understand.
- They receive little or no payment for the work performed.
- o They are obliged to share their income with others.
- Do not have access to their profits.
- They work long hours and for long periods of time in violation of the law.
- They don't have weekly days off or annual leave.
- o They live in poor or substandard conditions, when these are provided by the employer.
- Do not have access to healthcare.
- They have little or no social interaction.
- Have limited contact with family or people outside their immediate environment.
- Do not be free to communicate with others.
- They have the perception that they are tied to debt.
- They are in a situation of dependence.
- They come from a country known as a source of human trafficking.

- Have transportation fees paid by facilitators, who must repay them by working or providing services in the destination and transit country.
- o Have been recruited by private employment agencies for a fee, in violation of the law.
- o They acted based on false promises.
- They have shown elements of vulnerability in the past, such as domestic violence, sexual abuse/harassment, school dropout, etc.

#### Indicators of child trafficking

#### Children who have been trafficked may:

- o Do not have access to parents or guardians.
- They appear scared and behave in a manner that does not correspond to the typical behavior of children of their age and/or may refuse assistance.
- o They have no friends of their own outside of work.
- o They do not have access to education.
- o They don't have time to play.
- They live separately from other children and in poor conditions.
- They are accompanied by unrelated people when frequenting age-inappropriate places such as hotels or nightclubs.
- They eat separately from other members of the "family".
- They only take leftover food.
- They work night shifts.
- Perform work that may harm their safety and health at work or their physical, mental, moral or social development, or jeopardize their education or participation in cultural, commercial and similar activities.
- o They work in jobs that are unsuitable for them or in prohibited, difficult or dangerous jobs.
- o They travel within or outside the territory of the Republic of Albania unaccompanied by adults.
- They travel in groups with people who are not their relatives.
- Authorization has not been obtained from the Central Labour Inspectorate for the employment of a child under the age of 16.
- o They work long hours outside the provisions of labor legislation for them.

o They should not have any days off, weekly or annually.

#### Also, possible indicators of child trafficking may be:

- The presence of small children's clothes, usually used for physical or sexual work.
- The presence of children's toys, bedding, and clothes in inappropriate places, such as hotels or factories.
- o Statement by an adult that they have "found" an unaccompanied child.
- Finding unaccompanied children carrying phone numbers to call taxis.
- When the child is under the care of people who are not biologically related and do not have formal guardianship.

#### Indicators by form of trafficking

#### Sexual exploitation

#### Persons trafficked for the purposes of sexual exploitation may:

- They are of all ages, although age varies by location and market.
- o They move from one brothel to another or work in several places.
- They are part of online exploitation platforms/advertisements/networks.
- They are accompanied when they leave work or for other activities.
- o They have tattoos or markings that indicate "ownership" by their users.
- They work long hours and have no days off.
- o They sleep where they work.
- o They live or travel in groups with women who do not speak the same language.
- o They have very little clothing or mostly clothing suitable for sex work.
- Don't have money with you.
- o They do not have identification documents.
- o They don't know the area where they live and work.

#### <u>Indicators of child trafficking for sexual exploitation include:</u>

o Evidence that victims were forced to engage in unprotected or violent sexual intercourse.

- o Proof that victims cannot refuse unprotected or violent sexual intercourse.
- Proof that a person has been bought and sold.
- o Advertisements offering services to women of a particular ethnicity or nationality.

### Exploitation for forced labor and begging

### Persons trafficked for forced labor may:

- o Live in groups at their workplace and rarely leave the place.
- o Live in degraded and unsuitable conditions, such as industrial or agricultural buildings.
- Not have appropriate clothing for the work they perform.
- Receive only food scraps.
- Have no access to their earnings.
- o Not have a work contract or minimum labor standards are not respected.
- o Work long hours without rest.
- Depend on the employer for transportation and accommodation in degrading and unsuitable conditions
- o Be abused because to their vulnerability
- Be defrauded
- Be isolated from others
- Suffer physical and sexual abuse
- Be threatened or intimidated
- o Be deprived of their personal identification documents

#### People trafficked for begging or petty crimes may:

- o There are children, elderly, or people with disabilities who beg in public places.
- o There are children who transport and/or sell illegal drugs.
- They have physical injuries that appear to be the result of mutilation.
- o They move in groups and are accompanied by a small number of adults.
- They are punished if they don't collect or steal enough money.
- o They live and travel with their gang members.

#### Actions that need to be taken include:

- assessment of the situation of individuals in relation to indicators of trafficking;
- assessment of the potential/opportunities of the institution/organization to immediately remove the person from the situation of exploitation;
- intervention to immediately remove the person from the situation of exploitation/termination of exploitation (in person or through state police officers);
- immediate notification of the child protection worker in the event that the VT/PVoT is suspected of being a child;
- immediate notification of the official translator in the case of a foreigner
- informing the person about the employee's judgment on his/her situation, the rights and assistance that the institution itself can provide for potential victims of trafficking and victims of trafficking or ways to access assistance from victim protection institutions;
- notification of the Correspondent Member of the Responsible Authority (APAP) or the Head/Head of the Responsible Authority and communication with him/her regarding the placement of the person in a safe environment that meets his/her immediate needs;
- supporting the placement of the person in a safe and appropriate environment;
- assessment of the health situation and referral to health structures;
- assessment of the psychological situation
- completing the initial identification documentation and sending it to APAP
- supporting the formal identification process;
- support for the investigation and apprehension of traffickers
- continuity of protection.

#### Conditions for conducting the interview:

- the person who is a foreigner is interviewed by the G/SPIF in the presence of the translator who has previously signed the confidentiality statement, according to format A1;
- whenever possible, the person is interviewed by people of the same gender;
- the interview is conducted in an environment that is safe and secure for the person being interviewed and other people participating in the interview, away from people suspected of being involved in trafficking;
- the interview is conducted in premises/rooms that are sufficiently far from the room where

detained persons are held;

- the door to the room/environment where the interview will take place is kept closed throughout the interview to maintain confidentiality and not interrupt the interview, and the reasons for this are clearly explained to the person;
- Under no circumstances should the interview be interrupted due to other tasks that arise during the interview;
- The interview should be conducted in the presence of a legal guardian and, where applicable, the person should be able to receive primary legal assistance to ensure procedural rights and safeguard legal interests.
- Cell phones are kept silent by all the people present during the interview.

## Third parties who may participate in the interviews are:

- Translator in the case when we are dealing with foreign citizens.
- Psychologist for adults, according to case assessment and mandatory for children.
- Parent or legal guardian in the case of children.
- Child protection worker in the case of children.
- Interviewers and third parties participating in the interview are required to sign the confidentiality statement, according to the A1 format attached to this document.

#### Actions after the initial interview:

- 1. Request for formal identification according to A5 format, addressed to the responsible regional structure, attaching the declaration of consent for formal identification, according to A2 format.
- 2. Sending to the RA in A3/A4 format along with confidentiality statements after the initial interview.

#### **Documentation: Formats**

- Initial interview with the child;
- Initial interview with adults;
- Confidentiality Statement.

#### FORMAL IDENTIFICATION

**Formal identification** is the identification of a person as a victim of trafficking carried out solely by the Group/Structure Responsible for Formal Identification (G/SPIF) based on the formal interview format included in this document, which is carried out with the will of the victim herself and when she is ready to carry it out.

The means of formal identification is the formal interview and consultation with the RA. Through the interview, the person's status in relation to trafficking is definitively determined, an in-depth assessment of the person's needs for assistance and protection is made, guidance is provided and the trafficked person's access to appropriate long-term and safe assistance is ensured, and information is gathered to initiate investigations to penalize traffickers.

# State and non-state agencies/institutions responsible for formal identification:

Formal identification is carried out by regional ad-hoc structures (G/SPIF) that conduct formal interviews of persons identified as victims or potential victims of trafficking. In the case of child VT/PVoT, this structure consists of a state police officer from the anti-trafficking section and a child protection officer from the relevant municipality/administrative unit. In the case of adult VT/PVoT, the structure consists of a state police officer from the anti-trafficking section and a state social worker from the regional office of the state social service.

#### Formal Identification actions include:

- 1. Immediate intervention of the Sector for Investigation of Ilegal Trafficking, CHPO in the case of children and social services for adults. Conducting a formal interview when notified by the referring agency or when the (potential) victim of trafficking expresses his/her willingness to the state police structures to conduct a formal interview.
- 2. Determining whether the person is trafficked or a potential victim of trafficking, through the collection and analysis of information provided by the person themselves.
- 3. In-depth assessment of the needs of the (potential) victim of trafficking for assistance and protection by the CHPO or social service worker.
- 4. Providing guidance and ensuring the trafficked person's access to appropriate and safe assistance.
- 5. Gathering information and launching investigations to penalize traffickers.

#### Formal interview

The formal interview for children is conducted by a police officer and a child protection officer, while for adults it is conducted by a police officer and a state social service officer.

The interview is conducted in the presence of a guardian and, where applicable, the person may receive primary legal assistance to ensure procedural rights and safeguard legal interests.

For children, the needs assessment is carried out by the CPO. For adults, the assessment of the needs is carried out by a state social service employee.

CPUs/CPOs carry out and undertake concrete actions for the management of children's cases, with the aim of guaranteeing the protection or access to the child's rights.

The formal interview/verification of the person's status as trafficked is conducted prior to the report, while also assessing the most appropriate time later for statements or reports to the police and prosecution authorities.

#### Third parties who may participate in the formal interview:

- The case manager, case worker, or parent/legal guardian (provided they are not suspected of involvement in the trafficking) may be present during the interview if requested by the child or adult, but they may not conduct or direct the interview;
- Psychologist;
- Translator.

#### The conditions for a formal interview are:

- a request for an interview has been made by an institution;
- the person has proof of initial identification;
- the person who is a foreigner is interviewed only by translators who have signed a confidentiality statement;
- whenever possible, the person is interviewed by people of the same gender;
- the interview is conducted in an environment that is safe and secure for the person being interviewed and other people participating in the interview, away from people suspected of being involved in trafficking;
- the interview is conducted in premises/rooms that are sufficiently far from the room where detained persons are held;
- In cases where children are interviewed, a friendly and appropriate environment should be provided for them;
- the door to the room/environment where the interview will take place is kept closed throughout the interview to maintain confidentiality and not interrupt the interview, and the reasons for this are clearly explained to the person;

- Under no circumstances should the interview be interrupted due to other tasks arising during its
  - Mobile phones must be kept silent by all people present during the interview;
  - In order to avoid worsening the child's psychological state, conducting the interview twice on the same matter for the minor is prohibited.;

#### Duration of the formal interview:

- All formal identification actions must be carried out as quickly as possible.
- The child's formal interview lasts a maximum of 60 minutes.
- The formal adult interview lasts a maximum of 90 minutes.

#### Rights of the person to be interviewed:

- 1. the person to be interviewed is not kept waiting long;
- 2. the person is not interviewed in a group with other people;
- 3. the person is not interviewed if there are signs of physical or emotional unwellness;
- 4. the person is provided with immediate medical and psychological assistance if it is determined that he or she needs it;
- 5. the person being interviewed is clearly explained that he or she has the right to interrupt the interview at the moment he or she feels under pressure or is not of his or her full and free will to respond;
- 6. the person being interviewed and the guardian or parent in the case of a child are explained by any notes taken during the interview, the purposes for which the notes are taken and are given understandable information on how this information will be stored and with whom it will be shared;
- 7. The person being interviewed and the guardian or parent in the case of a child are clearly explained the procedure and purpose of the interview, the duration of the interview and are assured that they are free to interrupt the interview at any time.

#### Actions after the formal interview

- 1. After the formal interview, the interviewers organize a meeting that lasts no more than an hour to review the facts and make a decision;
- 2. The decision taken is sent electronically to the RA within the day.

#### **Documentation**

The standard formats that should be used to facilitate communication between institutions and agencies, as well as to document that responsible institutions are acting in accordance with these formal identification procedures are:

- Formal interview format for children;
- Formal interview format for adults;
- Formal identification notice.

# Procedure in case of disagreement between members of the G/SPIF on the status of the person interviewed

In cases where the members of the (G/SPIF) do not reach consensus on the determination of the person's status, the relevant file, together with all supporting documentation, is forwarded within the same day to the Responsible Authority for review and assessment.

The head of the Responsible Authority is obliged to convene a meeting of the members of the Responsible Authority (RA) within 24 hours from the moment of receipt of the file.

The RA meeting must be held in the mandatory presence of:

- all members of the PA,
- members of (G/SPIF), and
- responsible people who made the initial identification

During the meeting, based on the review of the documentation and facts presented, the Responsible Authority makes a final and binding decision on the person's status.

The decision of the RA is documented in official minutes and immediately communicated to the units responsible for further implementation of the procedures.

#### The right to appeal and the establishment of the Special Commission

Any person who is/ not recognized as a victim or potential victim of trafficking has the right to submit a written appeal against the decision made by the formal identification group within 30 working days from the receipt of the notification, either personally or through a legal representative/legal guardian.

In cases where the person is a child, the appeal against the decision is submitted by the parent or legal guardian.

The complaint is submitted to the secretariat of the Responsible Authority at the Ministry of Internal Affairs.

The review of complaints is carried out by a Special Inter-Institutional Commission, composed of representatives of these institutions:

- Ministry of Internal Affairs (chairs the committee);
- Ministry of Justice;
- Ministry of Health and Social Protection;
- Ministry of Education;
- Ministry of Economy and Innovation;
- Ministry for Europe and Foreign Affairs;

The Special Inter-Institutional Commission is the superior body that reviews the administrative appeal filed against the decision issued by the formal identification group.

The duties of the Special Inter-Institutional Commission are as follows:

- 1. To administer and review impartially all appeals submitted by persons who have been recognized or not recognized as victims or potential victims of trafficking by the formal identification group.
- 2. To verify the legality of the case file documentation, including the initial decision of the identification group, supporting evidence, and accompanying documents.
- 3. To examine the arguments and claims submitted by the appellant and/or their legal representative within the legally established deadlines.
- 4. To review proposals forwarded by the Responsible Authority regarding the reassessment of the victim/potential victim status, in cases where the person is considered to have been sustainably reintegrated (secure and long-term employment, safe housing, and full mental and physical health).
- 5. To ensure the collection and analysis of additional information from state institutions, involved organizations, or field experts, if deemed necessary to assess the case.
- 6. To guarantee respect for the principles of personal data protection, the rights of children and victims, and all parties involved throughout the appeal review process.
- 7. To make a reasonable administrative decision on the appeal, by majority vote of the members, within a maximum of 30 working days from the date of case file review.
- 8. To prepare and communicate the Commission's final decision to the appellant, the formal identification group, and the Responsible Authority.

9. To maintain full confidentiality of all information handled during the appeal review process.

An appeal may be filed against the decision of the Special Inter-Institutional Commission to the competent administrative court, in accordance with the provisions of the legislation in force.

An appeal against the decision of the Special Inter-Institutional Commission, in the administrative court, suspends the execution of the appealed decision.

The members of the Commission are determined by order of the minister responsible, at a high management level, and are communicated to the secretariat of the Responsible Authority within 30 days from the entry into force of the Decision of the Council of Ministers for the approval of this document.

The Commission is called to a meeting by the Chairman, within 5 working days from the filing of the complaint.

The Commission examines:

- The complete case file
- Initial decision of the identification group
- Arguments presented by the complainant and/or his/her legal representative
- Additional information from institutions or organizations that have been involved in the case

The Commission may request additional information or invite experts to assist in the assessment, if it deems it necessary.

The decision is made by majority vote and is final within the administrative procedure.

The Commission's meetings are held behind closed doors and all procedures are conducted in accordance with legislation on the protection of personal data and the rights of victims.

Each member of the Commission has an obligation to maintain confidentiality of the data and information reviewed during the appeal process.

The Commission's decision contains clear reasoning and does not contain sensitive identifying data in the version published to authorities for statistical purposes or policy monitoring.

#### REFERRAL PROTECTION AND ASSISTANCE

"Referral Protection and Assistance of VT and VMT" is the totality of actions undertaken

by employees of local and central, state and non-state institutions responsible for the protection of victims/potential victims of trafficking, at border points and within the territory of the Republic of Albania, to guarantee security, housing and social protection, psychological and legal health services, through specialized services and integrated approaches. Taking measures for the protection and assistance of VT and PVoT is carried out directly after the initial identification.

# The state and non-state agencies/institutions responsible for referral, protection and assistance are:

- Social services established at the municipal or district level;
- Local and regional structures of the state police;
- Social care centers for people in need;
- Organizations with assistance programs for people in need;
- Central Labor Inspectorate;
- Educational institutions:
- Healthcare institutions;
- · Child Protection Unit
- Other state and non-state agencies with activities in the field of protection of victims of trafficking.

#### General actions

- 1. In-depth assessment of the trafficked person's needs for assistance and protection with the participation of him/her and the parent/guardian if the person is a child.
- 2. The victim is provided with integrated social care based on a needs assessment.
- 3. Immediate protective measures and placement of VT/PVoT in a safe environment.
- 4. The victim is provided with immediate healthcare for medical emergencies, immediate psychosocial support from specialized professionals.
- 5. Legal assistance and document management.
- 6. Notification of the RA on the actions taken.

#### **Emergency measures**

After initial identification, the victim or potential victim of trafficking is immediately referred to an emergency center or specialized protection facility at the local level. A safe and confidential environment is provided to prevent any further risk or re-victimization.

#### For the Child

In situations of high and immediate risk due to abuse, exploitation, trafficking, neglect, or any other form of violence, and where the child protection worker and the structures of the State Police or the prosecution have suspicions or evidence that the family or environment where the child resides is not safe for them, the CPO initiates the process for taking the child into protection and imposes an emergency protective measure, immediately notifying the director of the municipal social services structure. The case worker from the emergency center/specialized protection structure informs the CPU. The CPU may notify the APAP and ASHMDF in cases where institutions do not respond during the case management process. Upon receiving the notification, APAP forwards the information to the Secretariat of the RA and, if necessary, requests the immediate convening of the RA to discuss any difficulties encountered in managing the case and the lack of response from responsible institutions.

The child protection worker/case manager, within 72 hours, requests the convening of the GTN and prepares the individual protection plan. Based on the GTN assessment, the child protection worker/case manager informs the case worker from the emergency center/specialized protection structure.

The case manager, together with the case worker, explains the formal interview process to the child and the parent/legal guardian in an understandable language, provided they are not suspected of involvement in trafficking/exploitation. The child protection worker contacts the trafficking investigation specialist to coordinate the formal interview and informs APAP.

At the conclusion of the formal interview, G/SPIF decides on granting the status of victim or potential victim of trafficking and determines the shelter where the case will be accommodated.

If the child at risk of trafficking is a foreign national, CPU initiates the emergency protection measure and arranges placement in a center for (unaccompanied) foreign children victims of trafficking, or in an emergency/specialized protection center. The CPO, assisted by the center's staff, immediately begins the procedure to obtain a residence permit and guardianship in order to ensure the child's protection and integration in accordance with the law.

The RA Secretariat requests the convening of the RA within 24 hours of receiving the notification to ensure a rapid and effective solution for documenting the child.

The family of a child victim of THB shall be provided assistance and support, as appropriate.

## Child placement at the emergency center

A social worker or psychologist at the center immediately admits the child, who is accompanied by the case manager, completes the admission statement, and informs the child and the guardian/parent (if present) about the center's facilities and rules.

A doctor at the center conducts the child's medical examination. In the absence of a doctor at the center, assistance from the emergency health service is requested if necessary.

The center staff ensures the child's basic needs, including food, clothing, and psychosocial support.

The center's case worker maintains ongoing contact with the CPU regarding any situation affecting the child's well-being, development, or safety. They also maintain regular contact with the CPO, who serves as the case manager for the child receiving services under the Individual Protection Plan, and inform the CPO of any situation impacting the child's well-being, development, or safety.

If the child is unaccompanied and a foreign national, the CPO, assisted by the center's staff, immediately initiates the procedure to obtain a residence permit and guardianship to ensure the child's protection and integration in accordance with the law.

If the child leaves the center without authorization, the center staff immediately notifies APAP and CPU, and a report is filed with the police regarding the absent child. APAP informs the RA Secretariat for further follow-up of the case.

If the child returns to the center, a socio-economic assessment of the situation is requested from CPU, similar to cases of children returning from abroad.

If it is assessed that the child is ready to leave the institution and the family/foster family provides a suitable environment for the child to continue living, the GTN is convened (including all actors familiar with the case as well as representatives of the center) to decide on modifying the protection measure. Following this decision, the PMF prepares the "measure for placing the child in alternative care with the family/foster family." This measure is approved by the Director of Social Services at the municipality and submitted to the Court for approval.

The RA Secretariat ensures further institutional coordination.

#### Placing the child in a shelter

A social worker or psychologist at the center immediately admits the child, who is accompanied by the case manager, and promptly familiarizes the child and the guardian/parent, if present, with the center's facilities.

The center staff immediately addresses the child's basic needs.

The head of the residential institution assigns a case worker, who will prepare an individual assistance plan for the case in collaboration with the institution's multidisciplinary team.

The case manager explains the assistance plan to the child in a language that is understandable to them.

The case manager informs the parent/legal guardian about the assistance plan, provided they are not suspected of trafficking or exploiting the child.

After accommodation, the case is informed within three days regarding the formal interview.

The staff of the center/shelter notifies the CPU, the case manager, and the police officer from the area where the child resides to organize the formal interview.

If the child is a foreign national, the case worker at the center/shelter immediately initiates the procedures to obtain a residence permit for the child.

APAP informs the RA Secretariat about the steps taken regarding the residence permit.

If the child leaves the center without authorization, the center's case worker files a report with the local structures for the Investigation of Illegal Trafficking and immediately notifies the CPU and the RA Secretariat.

APAP of ASHMDF informs the RA Secretariat.

In cases where the child is referred to a family/foster family, the CPU periodically informs APAP and ASHMDF regarding the monitoring and progress of the case.

The case worker collaborates with the CPU and CPO to ensure the child receives the necessary services and periodically reassesses the child's situation as needed.

#### Placing the adult in the emergency center

A social worker or psychologist at the center informs the (potential) trafficking victim about the facilities, rules of the center, and the rehabilitation program. After completing the admission statement, the (potential) trafficking victim is immediately admitted.

The center's doctor conducts a medical examination of the victim. If there is no doctor at the center, the person is referred to the nearest health center, and in urgent cases, the emergency medical service is called.

The center staff ensures the victim's basic needs, including food, clothing, and psychosocial support.

After meeting the basic needs, the case worker (social worker or psychologist) prepares a report for the RA, identifying the need for RA intervention.

The report is sent to the RA Secretariat for review and further coordination.

APAP of SSS requests the convening of the RA to discuss and decide on protective measures for the victim.

If the victim leaves the center without authorization, the center's staff immediately notifies APAP of SSS, who in turn informs the RA Secretariat for further follow-up of the case.

If the victim is referred to a family or community setting, the case worker immediately informs APAP, who informs the Regional Directorate of SSS to continue monitoring the case and the RA Secretariat for further institutional coordination.

#### Placing adults in shelters

A social worker or psychologist at the center informs the (potential) trafficking victim about the center's facilities, rules, and rehabilitation program. After completing the admission statement, the (potential) trafficking victim is immediately admitted.

The head of the institution assigns a case worker/manager, who will prepare an individual assistance plan for the case in collaboration with the institution's multidisciplinary team.

The case manager explains the assistance plan to the victim in a language that is understandable to them and seeks their cooperation in its implementation.

Within three days of accommodation in the institution, the case manager informs the (potential) trafficking victim of their right to undergo the formal interview.

If the (potential) trafficking victim is a foreign national, the case manager immediately initiates the procedures to obtain a residence permit. APAP of SSS informs the RA Secretariat about the steps taken regarding the residence permit.

If the (potential) trafficking victim is a foreign national and lacks any identification documents, the staff requests that APAP negotiate with the diplomatic representation of the country of origin to provide identification documents.

If the (potential) trafficking victim leaves the shelter without authorization, the staff immediately notifies APAP, who informs the RA Secretariat.

If the (potential) trafficking victim is referred to a family or community setting, the staff immediately notifies APAP. APAP informs Regional directorate of SSS for further case monitoring and the AP Secretariat for continued institutional coordination.

If the (potential) trafficking victim refuses any form of assistance, the staff requests that APAP of SSS notify the police APAP regarding the suspicions and request further follow-up of the case.

#### Health services

APAP of SSS facilitates the procedures for covering mandatory health insurance for (potential) trafficking victims as economically inactive persons, with their contribution payments financed by the State Budget, in order to enable them to benefit from the mandatory health insurance service packages.

Public Health Care Service providers offer the necessary assistance to VT and PVoT in accordance with the applicable legal framework.

The entry point into the public health system is the Health Center, except in cases of medical emergencies.

For (potential) trafficking victims accommodated in shelters, medical services may be provided at the nearest health center.

Primary health care staff, based on the results of the health examination and treatment protocols, either provide care at this level or refer the case for more specialized services according to the applicable referral system.

Provision of health care for children is ensured with the informed consent of the legal guardian or the case manager.

Primary health care staff guide the legal guardian of child VT/PVoT regarding the steps to be taken to maintain and improve the child's health.

They notify NJVKSH by phone and email, who in turn notify APAP, which informs the RA Secretariat by email.

#### **EDUCATION**

Education employees in GTN are required to re-register Children in educational institutions.

In the event of a referral by a state or non-state entity/structure/institution of a child or adult with VT or PVoT, the education worker must register for the continuation of the curriculum.

The CPU or the residential center employee prepares the necessary documentation for registration at the educational institution and accompanies the child to the educational institution.

The education employee notifies the APAP of the Ministry of Education regarding the referred case, which provides guidance on handling the case and notifies the RA Secretariat.

#### Documentation:

- Document of admission to the shelter/residential/emergency center;
- Assessment of VT and PVoT needs;
- Health reports and recommendations;
- Minutes of the RA meeting.

#### Registration at the civil registry office

The case manager, in cases where he/she finds or does not have data that the child is registered in the civil registry, notifies the secretariat of the RA at the Ministry of Internal Affairs to enable his/her registration through the General Directorate of Civil Registry.

#### ASSISTED VOLUNTARY RETURN

**Assisted voluntary return** is the set of actions that ensure that victims of trafficking, as well as individuals suspected of trafficking, return to their countries of origin in a safe manner. This process aims to ensure that returnees will not face criminal prosecution and receive the necessary assistance and protection to prevent re-victimization and to assist in their integration upon return.

The state and non-state agencies/institutions responsible for referral, protection and assistance are:

- Ministry for Europe and Foreign Affairs (MEFA);
- Diplomatic Missions of the Republic of Albania;
- State Social Service (SSS);
- Border and Migration Police Authorities;
- Residential Centers and Municipal Social Services;
- health care institution
- Educational institutions
- Child Protection Service
- SAPCR

The Technical Secretariat of the Responsible Authority, established by joint instruction No. 132 dated 08.09.2023, is the focal point for cross-border referral of victims/potential victims of trafficking.

#### For children

The case worker at the center where the child is accommodated, as soon as possible and no later than 7 days from the child's arrival/entry into the program, submits a request for locating and assessing the family and the risks in the country of origin.

APAP from MEFA forwards the request to the authorities of the country of origin, who can carry out the assessment.

The response to the request is sent to the residential institution.

The head of the RA, within 1 week of receiving the response, convenes the RA to review the best interests of the child. If the child's best interest is determined to be returned to the country of origin, the tasks for organizing the return are assigned according to the decision, and funds for the child's travel are secured.

APAP from the Border and Migration service follows the procedure for providing the child with travel documents.

The case manager, together with the center where the child is accommodated, ensures an escort for the child during the trip.

APAP from MHSP coordinates the provision of the child's medical examination prior to travel, following the approval of the legal guardian.

#### For adults

The caseworker of the center where the VT/PVoT is accommodated makes a request to find and assess the family and the risk in the country of origin.

The director of the center where the VT/PVoT is accommodated, within a day of preparation, reviews and sends the request to the RA.

The APAP from the MEFA transfers the request to the authorities of the country of origin who can make the assessment.

The response to the request is sent to the residential institution.

The head of the RA, within 1 week of receiving the response, convenes the RA for review.

If return to the country of origin is assessed, the tasks of organizing the return are assigned according to the decision and travel funds are provided.

APAP from the border and migration follows the procedure of providing VT/PVoT with a travel document.

The center where the VT/PVoT is accommodated provides a companion during the trip.

The APAP from the Ministry of Health and Social Affairs provides medical check-ups for adults before travel.

Complementarity and coordination between authorities involved in anti-trafficking activites and the asylum authorities are ensured to provide assistance and protection to victims of trafficking who are also in need of international protection or who wish to apply for such protection, considering the victim's individual circumstance.

#### Documentation

- Request for family and risk assessment in the country of origin;
- Minutes of the meeting and decision of the RA;
- Health assessment, psychological.

# RECEPTION OF TRAFFICKED PERSONS WITH ALBANIAN CITIZENSHIP

"Reception of trafficked persons with Albanian citizenship" is the set of actions undertaken by employees of state institutions and non-state actors responsible for the protection of trafficked persons, for creating conditions for the return to Albania, for receiving and meeting the needs of VT and PVoT.

The state and non-state agencies/institutions responsible for referral, protection and assistance are:

- Diplomatic Representations of the Republic of Albania;
- Central and Regional/Local State Social Service;
- Municipal Social Services (MSS);
- Child Protection Unit (CPU);
- State Police / Border and Migration Department.
- ASHDMF

#### General actions

The employee of the Diplomatic Mission of the Republic of Albania immediately informs the RA on the finding/location of the trafficked person in the country of destination/transit.

The RA Secretariat immediately drafts and sends the request for assessment (socio-economic and security) to the APAPs from the MHSP (MHSP, ASHMDF and SSS).

APAP from MHSP/ SSS forwards the request for assessment to the Municipality Social Worker. APAP from MHSP / ASHMDF forwards the request for assessment to the CPU, regarding the family situation of the child who is expected to return.

Within 1 week, the RNCU conducts the assessment of adults and within 15 days, the CPU conducts the assessment of the child's family.

APAP immediately sends the assessment of the case to the RA Secretariat in electronic format.

The APAP of the MEFA sends the assessment to the country of destination/transit.

The APAP of the MEFA notifies the Secretariat of the RA regarding the decision of the counterpart authorities of the country of destination/transit on assisted voluntary return and the documentation that may be required from the country of origin.

The head of the RA convenes the RA within 2 days of the decision to assign tasks related to the reception.

#### Documentation:

- Request for evaluation;
- Evaluation;
- Response from the destination country;
- Minutes of the RA meeting.

# SUPPORTING THE INVESTIGATION AND CONVICTION OF TRAFFICKERS

"Supporting the investigation and punishment of traffickers" is the set of actions taken by employees of state and non-state institutions responsible for the protection of trafficked persons at borders, within and outside the territory of the Republic of Albania, of local institutions, as well as central ones (especially members of the RA) that make it possible to collect and analyze information for the investigation and prosecution of traffickers.

Agencies/institutions responsible for supporting the investigation and conviction of traffickers:

All Defense Institutions

#### General actions:

- 1. After each interview conducted with a suspected trafficked case, the interviewer immediately share the information obtained with APAP;
- 2. APAP immediately shares information received with APAP from the State Police (Illegal Trafficking Investigation Sector);
- 3. The APAP from the State Police analyzes the information and suggests whether it is necessary to launch a proactive investigation into the case.
- 4. As for the protection of victims and child victims of trafficking in criminal investigation and

proceedings, these SOPs should be read in conjunction with the other relevant anti-trafficking regulatory frameworks, particularly the Criminal Procedure Code.

#### Documentation:

Interview format.

# LONG-TERM SUPPORT AND SOCIAL ECONOMIC RE/INTEGRATION

Long-term support and reintegration of trafficked persons is the set of actions by state and non-state agencies to enable the recovery and social and economic inclusion of Victims and potential victims of trafficking. It includes placement in a safe and stable environment, access to a reasonable standard of living, physical and mental well-being and opportunities for personal, social, economic development and access to social and emotional support. A central aspect of successful reintegration is that of empowering, supporting victims to develop skills towards independence and self-sufficiency and to be actively involved in their recovery and re/integration.

# The state and non-state agencies/institutions responsible for long-term support and socio-economic reintegration are:

- Local social services;

#### General actions

The social worker or case manager develops an individual reintegration plan for VT and PVoT. The individual plan includes needs for assessment and psychosocial support, health, housing, education, employment, vocational training and economic support.

The plan is sent to the RA and the KRAT to coordinate interventions with all members to address reintegration needs.

After the assessment, the RA issues a decision within 7 days with concrete tasks for the case that must be followed by each member.

The social worker or case manager reports 3 times a month on the progress of the reintegration plan to the RA.

The APAP of the MHSP monitors and coordinates the provision of long-term health and psychological services as well as referral to specialized psychiatric services when necessary.

The APAPs of the MHSP, in collaboration with local social services, monitor and coordinate the provision of accommodation in protected shelters, meeting basic needs for food, clothing, transportation, medical services, transition to independent housing such as social housing, rental subsidies, etc., and the benefit of economic assistance.

The APAP of AKPA follows up and coordinates support for employment, vocational training and self-employment through registration as a job seeker, referrals for vocational training courses and enrollment in public vocational schools, and inclusion in employment and self-employment promotion schemes through micro-grants or mentoring.

The APAP of the Ministry of Justice monitors and coordinates free legal advice and protection for criminal, civil, or administrative matters.

The APAP of the Ministry of Internal Affairs monitors and coordinates assistance in obtaining or renewing identification documents.

The RA Secretariat monitors the progress of reintegration for a period of up to 24 months.

Depending on the progress of the case, the social worker or case manager also reviews the reintegration plan, which is sent to the RA.

If it is assessed that the person has been sustainably reintegrated (secure and long-term employment, safe housing, and full mental and physical health), the social worker or case manager prepares a reasoned report and submits it to the Responsible Authority for forwarding to the Special Inter-Institutional Commission for review and for an informed decision regarding the status of victim/potential victim of trafficking.

#### A4. INITIAL INTERVIEW WITH ADULTS

Before conducting an initial interview with an adult who may be a victim of trafficking, special measures should be taken to ensure his/her safety and well-being throughout the process. First, it should be ensured that the environment where the interview takes place is such as to avoid overhearing or interference by other people. It is also essential that the interview is conducted by an interviewer of the same gender as the interviewee, to ensure a sensitive approach and to facilitate communication. The interviewer should clearly introduce himself/herself and explain the purpose of the interview, creating an environment of trust and transparency. Before starting the interview, it is important to obtain the person's opinion regarding the location where the interview will take place and the participants in it, to ensure that he/she feels comfortable and safe. The relationship with the interpreter, if present, should also be assessed, giving the interviewee the opportunity to express whether he/she feels comfortable with him/her or not. Finally, interviewers must ensure that the person is in good health and psychological condition that allows the interview to be conducted, in accordance with standards for the protection of the rights of potential victims of trafficking.
